



NEVER AGAIN.

I was in London for a number of weeks during the pandemic and received an email from a much older British family friend, Raymond, whom I had talked to fairly recently. He asked for a favor. He said it was his niece's 16th birthday and he wanted to buy an Amazon gift card for her but no stores near him sold them AND he couldn't navigate the online website to buy one for her. This seemed plausible to me because he's over 85 years old, lives in the country, and he had asked me for computer help in the past. We had several back and forth email exchanges, during which I told him why he shouldn't buy anything from Amazon and why I think it's such a bad company. So \*instead\* I suggested he buy a Mastercard, VISA, or Apple gift card for her. I sent him the websites to purchase these. I told him I wasn't available to go to an actual store for him until later. He asked if I could buy the gift cards for him and that he'd send me a check to cover the costs or give me cash next time we saw one another. Later that afternoon, he sent another email reminding me that he still needed the cards. I told him there was no way I could give him the actual gift cards but he replied (too readily, this should have tipped me off), that it was OK as long as I could give him the identification/activation numbers on the cards and add the contact information he supplied to me. And so I did. To the tune of 150 pounds! Two days later, Raymond emailed me to say that the niece's sister also needed a 150 pounds worth of gift cards. !!! That's when it hit me I'd been scammed. My next calls were to Apple, the Metropolitan Police, and to my credit card company. The gift cards had been used just moments after I bought them but, because of my swift reporting, the credit card company refunded the entire purchase price. Almost lost 150 pounds.



I think the major reason for all of those happening every day is because of the leakages of information. I do have one online shopping platform has been reported of this issue. However, once the data is leaked, we are unable to get away with those annoying scams. I lost some money! It's a pain...I hope no one else experiences this!




## 103. EBAY GIFT CARD




## 113. ASSORTMENT OF REJECTION LETTERS, KNIT
